

Behavior Management and Intervention

School personnel will work to promote good student behavior to foster a safe and orderly environment where all students can be fully engaged in the learning process.

Student conduct that disrupts class work, involves disorder, or interferes with the rights of others will not be tolerated and may be cause for disciplinary action, up to and including possible suspension/expulsion. The administration of disciplinary action will focus on both — consequences and on changing or managing inappropriate behavior.

It is important that there be careful evaluation of the individual situation so that the school’s response to the student is appropriate.

If the student has an Individualized Education Program (IEP), the process will follow federal and state laws governing special education.

All available resources should be utilized, including preventive and responsive interventions to support students’ needs. These interventions may include, but not necessarily be limited to, psychological, curricular, and behavior plans, which should take place within classrooms, schools, and alternative settings. Exclusion from the classroom should be the disciplinary action of last resort.

The principal will also ensure that classroom behavior management skills are addressed through professional development, and that there is an adequate system of recordkeeping regarding disciplinary infractions and interventions.

The use of corporal punishment is prohibited in District schools.
